Neighborhood Cats Network, Inc, is an all-volunteer 501(c)(3) non-profit organization passionately dedicated to transforming the lives of homeless community cats throughout Western NY, with a special focus on Monroe and

Ontario Counties. Our mission goes beyond simply helping cats—we're revolutionizing community cat care through our groundbreaking TNVRM program: Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return-Manage. Not only do we humanely reduce the number of stray cats, but we also go the extra mile by managing colonies with compassion, ensuring they have winterized cat cabins, clean and safe feeding stations and, most importantly, daily nourishing meals.

These essentials, especially during the harsh winter months, are lifesaving, keeping every cat healthy, warm, and cared for. Over the past few years, we've built and donated over 120 cat cabins and feeding stations to other

rescues and individuals who care for community cats on their property.



Our efforts don't stop there—we proudly collaborate with business owners to establish organized and aesthetically pleasing colonies on their properties. These partnerships not only provide cats a safe place to live but also enhance the look and feel of the properties, creating a peaceful coexistence between the community and its feline neighbors.

#### **A Success Story**

One success story that highlights the impact of Neighborhood Cats Network involves a local business owner who had grown increasingly upset with the presence of a small cat colony on his property. For a year, he had watched four

cats occupy the area and, frustrated by what he saw as clutter, contemplated asking his neighbor-who had been feeding the catsto stop. The makeshift shelters and feeding station, shown in Figure 1, had become an eyesore in his eyes. He was close to taking drastic action that could have left the cats without food or shelter.

Fearing for the cats' well-being, the neighbor reached out to the Neighborhood Cats Network for assistance. Our team immediately stepped in to mediate the situation. We explained the importance of providing a stable feeding area and safe, secure shelters to protect the colony's health and survival. Not only did we clean and reorganize the area, but we also implemented Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return-Manage (TNVRM) services and donated winterized cabins and a more permanent feeding station to enhance the appearance and functionality of the space (Fig. 2).

Impressed by the improvements and our dedication to the humane care of the

cats, the business owner agreed to let the colony stay on his property. This partnership turned a potential crisis into a success, ensuring that the four cats could continue to live safely while receiving regular meals. What could

have been a devastating situation for these community cats became a powerful story of collaboration, education, and compassion.

#### **Community Cat Myths**

Myth: Community cats are wild animals.

**Reality**: Community cats are domestic cats that have had little or no human contact. While they may be unsocialized, they are still part of the domestic cat species.

Myth: Community cats can't be spayed or neutered because they are too difficult to handle.

**Reality:** With the right tools and experience, Community cats can be humanely trapped and safely spayed or neutered through Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return-Manage (TNVRM) programs.

Myth: Community cats live miserable, short lives.

**Reality:** When provided with proper care, such as food, water, and shelter through colony management, community cats can live healthy, long lives. TNVRM helps ensure their well-being.

Myth: Removing community cats from an area is the best solution.



**Reality:** Removing community cats often leads to the "vacuum effect," where new cats move into the area to fill the void. TNVRM programs are a more effective, humane solution for stabilizing the population.

Myth: Community cats spread disease to humans.

**Reality:** Community cats pose minimal health risks to humans. TNVRM programs also include vaccinations that reduce disease transmission, such as rabies.

Myth: Community cats should be taken to shelters to be adopted.



- **Reality:** Most community cats are not socialized enough to live indoors or be adoptable as pets. Their best option is often to remain in managed colonies outdoors through TNVRM.
- Myth: Feeding community cats will cause more problems.

**Reality**: Managed feeding can help stabilize colonies, prevent wandering, and improve the colony's health. TNVRM and proper colony management address the real issues.

Myth: Community cats are the primary threat to bird populations.

**Reality:** While cats can impact local wildlife, the decline in bird populations is primarily due to habitat loss, pollution, and climate change. TNVRM programs help manage community cat colonies, reducing their roaming and impact on wildlife, while addressing the root issues through responsible colony management.

#### **Colony Spotlight: Grace and the Cats of Meow Meadows**

Seven years ago, Grace's existence was reduced to a cold, metal tube in a desolate, unforgiving landscape. Alongside her feral companions-- Riley, Bangkok, Benji, Pippi, Gertrude, and Jerry-- she fought tooth and claw for survival, each bitter night a struggle for warmth and food, never knowing if tomorrow would come.

Then in December, as temperatures plunged, the call for help went out to Neighborhood Cats Network. We couldn't stand idly by and watch these brave souls suffer any longer. With the support of a compassionate business owner and the unwavering dedication of our



passionate volunteers, we sprang into action. Despite the freezing conditions, we trapped, spayed, and vaccinated the entire colony, pouring every ounce of our energy into creating winterized cabins and feeding stations—shelters of warmth they had

never known.

Today, Grace and her family thrive in the colony we lovingly call "Meow Meadows." Each day brings nourishing meals, and at night, they curl up in cozy shelters, shielded from the brutal elements. Grace

is finally living the life she always deserved, her spirit free to flourish in a way she never imagined possible.

This transformation is nothing short of miraculous. lt's powerful testament to what happens when compassion meets action. Together, we can rewrite the stories of countless community cats just like Grace, turning despair into hope and survival into a vibrant life!
